What can I do? What can my Parish Community do?

BISHOP RICHARD MOTH launched a new Criminal Justice Roadshow on Saturday 13 July at Cobham's Sacred Heart Church with these words 'What can I do?' and 'What can my parish community do?' Bishop Richard suggested that would-be volunteers focus on these two questions.

The first of 22 Roadshow events in England and Wales, it is designed to explore how Christians can, and should, respond to those in prison, their families and communities. A&B was chosen for the first event because of Bishop Richard's connection to the Prison Service.

The day was hosted by Pact and CSAN. Pact (Prison Advice Care Trust) have been supporting prisoners for 120 years as a Catholic Charity and CSAN (Caritas Social Action Network). Caritas in their title means Christian Love... which is expressed in their charitable action. CSAN is the UK network for Catholic charities and is part of Caritas Internationalis, the seond largest NGO in the world.

Introducing the event to 80 plus delegates from across Arundel and Brighton and beyond, Bishop Richard said 'We have 83,000 people in prison. Our society resorts to imprisonment quite easily; sentences have got longer, and we imprison people

largely in Victorian buildings designed for incarceration, not for rehabilitation.'

Delegates heard presentations and took part in workshops covering prison-based family services, community based services, the community chaplaincy, prisons families' helpline, London befriending and court support services.

Currently the prisons in our diocese covered by Pact are Coldingley (Bisley, Surrey), Send (Woking), Downview and Highdown (Banstead, Surrey), and Ford (Littlehampton, West Sussex). Bishop Richard added that the parishes around our prisons are especially invited to volunteer. Chaplains from all these prisons attended the Roadshow and led a workshop.

Responding to a question, Bishop Richard advised that prison legislation and reform is happening now following representation from the Bishop's Conference, including a call to avoid sending people to prison on short sentences for relatively minor crimes and the recommendation that community-based punishments be used instead.

The most moving part of the day was a talk by Jamie, an ex prisoner, who said: 'In 1997, I murdered two men.' He outlined his journey from knife killer, through to his need for reconciliation and help, to his new, law-abiding life, holding down a job and contributing to society. 'I consider every day a privilege,' Jamie said, 'and it all started with my first visitor on my first day in prison, Fr Frank.'

Jamie, now out on licence, says he will never forget his two victims, who were aged 24 and 26, when he murdered them. 'It is so difficult to ask for forgiveness,' he explained. 'I was supported during my time in prison, and after I was released. I am so grateful to those who volunteered to support me.' Jamie's Catholic faith continues to sustain him.

Further lived experiences followed from the organisations represented. During lunch conversations continued in small groups. After lunch Speed Workshops took place where delegates split up into roughly equal groups and attended all the workshops with strict time limits in each. Pact



Pact offers a wealth of different opportunities to get involved, either as individual volunteers or as whole parish communities, with

free training and support from a Pact manager, including:

Prison visitor centres volunteers

Working within the prison visitors centre attached to prisons, and in the prisons, duties can include making tea and coffee for prisoners' families, listening and

being there for the visitors who can find the whole experience very overwhelming, and also supporting children in Pact Play Schemes, some of whom can find the whole experience very daunting and upsetting. Shifts are in four-hour blocks.

Mentoring

Pact supports men and women on release from prison to give them the best possible chance of a fresh start. You can train as a volunteer mentor with Pact. No specific experience is required, just good boundaries, reliability, patience, and a willingness to learn.

If Pact are not able to offer you an opportunity in your area, they can refer you to the local chaplain.

Operation Elf

Operation Elf is Pact's Christmas Campaign for Prisoners' Children. It's a bit like a Food Bank, but for children's toys, books and other gifts. Parishes who sign up to the scheme are provided with specially branded 'Santa Sacks' for the back of Church, and a poster listing the kinds of items needed by children whose parents are in the local prisons. Community Chaplaincy

The objective is to attract those interested in supporting both the families of prisoners while they are in prison and subsequently the prisoners and their families on release. The families requiring support would be identified and referred via the Prison Chaplaincy service. Full training is provided and there is a buddying/support process to ensure volunteers feel ready before working with

the families. Levels of involvement/commitment are flexible and are driven by the volunteer themselves. Contact is through <u>communitychaplaincy.org.uk</u>

Prison Chaplaincy

Working inside the prisons to support the prisoners in their faith journey and the challenges of daily life in prison, supporting/running scripture groups, discussion groups, listening to individuals who need an ear to talk to.

Welcome Directory

This is a programme that any parish can join, aimed at educating parishioners about the realities of prison and the support that both ex-offenders and their families need from a caring and loving community. There are three training days for the parish leadership team to complete before the Parish is awarded the Welcome Directory kitemark. The parish is then entered into The Welcome Directory and signposted as a safe place for exprisoners and prisoners' families to go without risk of stigma where they can be guaranteed a warm welcome. 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Brighton Celebrate Conference 2019

'Be Strong and Courageous for the Lord your God is with You Wherever You Go'

ONCE AGAIN, the Diocesan annual Catholic Charismatic Event 'Celebrate Brighton' was held at Cardinal Newman School Hove on 13-14 July. Over 300 people enjoyed a transformed sports hall to praise and worship God through lively music, drama, talks and workshops exploring the theme of the weekend 'Be strong and courageous for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go. (Joshua 1:9 NLT).

Children were looked after in age appropriate 'streams' and, followed their own fun-filled programme, joining the adults to celebrate and participate in Masses on both days.

There were also opportunities for people to receive prayer from a prayer team and attendees were encouraged to be open to whatever God wanted to say or do for them.

Pope Francis Launches CHARIS

At Pentecost this year. Pope Francis launched CHARIS. a new service for Catholic Charismatic Renewal worldwide that brought together previous charismatic organisations in the Catholic Church, giving it canonical

He clarified his vision for Charismatic renewal in the Church by giving it three areas to concentrate on: 1. Evangelisation – To share 'baptism in the Holy Spirit' with everyone in the Church

2. Ecumenism - serving the unity of the body of Christ 3. Serving the poor.

At the launch in Rome, preacher to the papal household, Father Raniero Cantalamessa, said 'charismatic' should always be an adjective rather than a noun: one can no more speak of 'charismatics' as a specific group than one can speak of 'charitables', for it is in the nature of the whole church to be charismatic, as it


Through the representation of various charities such as Mary's Meals and Welcome Home Trust Tanzania, participants also had opportunities to respond to the needs of the poor

East Worthing Parish Celebration of the Church as Family

WAY BACK in the Autumn of 2018, at a diocesan function, Deacon John Body had mentioned in conversation to Bishop Richard that he and his wife Sue. would be celebrating their 40th Wedding Anniversary on 30 June 2019 and that this would also be the 15th Anniversary of Deacon John's Ordination to the Permanent Diaconate. On hearing about this Bishop Richard suggested that he would like to come along to the parish to celebrate with them at the normal 10.30 Parish Mass. It was from such an off the cuff conversation that a whole series of events were to join forces to bring about a wonderful celebration of the Church as Family.

The sun came out to shine in spades on the morning of Sunday 30 June, the Solemnity of the Apostles Peter and Paul. Unknown to Deacon John back in the Autumn, the timetable for our Parish Sacramental Programmes had already been set and 30 June was to be Certificate Day and Sending Forth for those young people from the parish community who had celebrated either Confirmation (Arundel Cathedral, 19 May) or First Eucharist (Holy Family, Lancing, 16 June) this year.

Planning for the Event

Parishioners were aware of John and Sue's celebration and had organised to prepare tasty comestibles at home and drop them off in the Parish Centre before going into the church ready for Mass. What was not known in the Parish was that Fr Daryl had, some months previously, applied, through the Bishop's office, to the Holy Father for two members of the Parish to be considered for the Bene Merenti award for longstanding service to the Diocese, the Parish and the local community in Lancing. Initially, Fr Daryl had thought that if the Bishop was coming to the Parish it would be appropriate that he should present these awards, however, it was not until the Tuesday before the Mass that the Bishop contacted Fr Daryl to say that they had arrived from Rome. So it was, at this point, that Fr Daryl made contact with the recipient's large extended family to tell them about the award and invite them to be present. Many of the family were from surrounding parishes and their presence would have tipped-off the recipients that something was up had they been seen. The Homily

The Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem **Jordan Pilgrimage 2019**

m NIGHTS}$ AND DAMES of the Order go on two pilgrimages to the Holy Land (Palestine, Israel and Jordan) annually, to support the Christians there especially the Christian schools, which they finance. Across the Holy Land the Latin Patriarchate operates 41 schools and 35 kindergartens, educating about 19,000 pupils, Christian and

My husband, Michael, (extreme right in group photo of Southern Section KHS) is a relatively new Knight and we recently joined their Spring pilgrimage at the Jordan part of the trip. The spiritual leader was Fr Mark Madden KCHS. A priest of Liverpool Archdiocese he is the Chaplain of the Northern Section and is parish priest of English Martyrs' Parish, Litherland Liverpool. We were privileged to be accompanied by The Most Rev Malcolm McMahon OP KC*HS, the Archbishop of Liverpool and also the Prior of the Northern Section of the KHS. There were about 40 of us in total.

Amman, Jordan

We stayed in the Visitation Convent (Rosary Sisters) on the outskirts of Amman, and the first evening joined in a Marian Procession which took place there (pictured below). This was a surprise event for us all, and one that we really appreciated – being amongst local Christians and celebrating with them, albeit in Arabic.

Our first outing was to the Jubeiha School in Amman a school of 800 children age 6-18. We were given a huge welcome. The pupils are about 50% Muslim and 50% Christian, and the school has an excellent reputation. The little ones performed a song for us, we saw displays of crafts and artwork, and a traditional dance by the teenagers, boys and girls. There was a strong feeling of love and optimism amongst the staff and pupils, a real enthusiasm for learning and for the school as a whole. It was a lovely experience.

Mount Nebo and Gadara

A very special holy site is Mount Nebo from where God showed Moses the Promised Land, which he would never reach. It was a deeply quiet and holy place – we could see the Dead Sea, the lower Jordan Valley, Jericho and, in the far distance, Jerusalem. One wondered



how Moses felt, seeing this but never reaching it.

Another special place was Gadara, the likely place where Jesus cast out the demons into the 'Gadarene swine'. It was Archbishop Malcolm's favourite site, from where can be seen the Sea of Galilee, the upper Jordan Valley, the Golan Heights and Syria beyond. Auxiliary Bishop William Shomali, the Patriarchal Vicar for Jordan, gave us an audience. It was very interesting learning about the situation of Christians in Jordan – which is a tolerant and stable country allowing Christians full practice of their faith (although proselytising is illegal). We were served tiny cups of herbal tea and sweets in the Jordanian manner.

Refugee Centre and Jerash

Another highlight was the visit to the Refugee Centre run by an Italian priest.. Fr Mario Cornioli. He and the young Iraqi Christian women we met gave us a warm welcome and we were invited to see their handiwork, which many of us bought. The work helps the refugees to have a useful life, as legally they cannot obtain work in Jordan.

The Roman town of Jerash was a won-

derful experience, covering many acres and showing in considerable detail how a Roman town was laid out, some of the streets being almost intact. We were treated to a display of 'Roman soldiers' with their weapons, and their chariots and horses - some of us got to ride in the chariots too!

The trip was very well-organised and we had an excellent guide throughout, and despite the heat (37c at times) it felt very worthwhile and a true spiritual experience. We had Mass every day, usually at local Christian churches and with local people, which felt very special. It helps to know how it is to be a Catholic Christian in a non-Christian country. Perhaps we are all feeling that here in the UK too!




Day of Celebration and Mass of Thanksgiving for Our Catholic School Leaders



Pollowing on from the highly successful Catholic Leaders' Day held last year on the theme 'I am the true Vine', the Education Service welcomed over 50 Headteachers, Senior Leaders, Governors, school Chaplains and members of staff involved in the ministry of Catholic school leadership, to a Day of Celebration and Mass of Thanksgiving on the Pastoral Plan theme 'The Word who is Life'.

This year, the event was hosted by the Eastbourne Deanery on the sunshine coast, in beautiful surroundings by the sea. The focus of the day was to celebrate and give thanks for the wonderful contribution Catholic leaders make to





schools in our diocese. The day opened with a Mass of Thanskgiving celebrated by Bishop Richard, during which Bishop Richard took the opportunity to formally commission recently trained Section 48 Inspectors, thanking them for undertaking this important ministry in Catholic schools.

Following that, Director of Education Marie Ryan warmly welcomed school leaders and used the coastal context to reflect on the Word through the lens of what it meant to be a fisherman in the 1st Century. In a rich and carefully crafted presentation, she explained that when Jesus chose his very first disciples, he didn't go to the establishment; he didn't recruit the educated or the wealthy, he deliberately sought out fishermen to be his ambassadors and to spread the Word.

'Come, follow me' Jesus said, 'and I will send you out to fish for people.' At once they left their nets and followed him; Matthew 4:19-20 (photo left courtesy of Wintershall).

Through this inspiring and very well received presentation, delegates were encouraged to consider what life was like for the first disciples and how they might relate this back to their current situation as Catholic Leaders in the 21st century. After the presentation, delegates were given some time to reflect in small groups on the qualities of leadership: authenticity, respect, love, service, honesty, integrity and prayer.

To finish the day, delegates were treated to a lively dramatic session on 'breaking open the Word', led by actors from Wintershall . The vibrant and engaging retelling of scripture demonstrated perfectly how the Word can be brought to life and accessible for all.

If you were not already aware our planet is currently experiencing an ecological crisis. What do I mean by ecological crisis? Story: John Paul de Quay

THE CRISIS

WE ARE CONNECTED to neighbour, nature and planet in an integral ecology, linked through economy, travel, communication, the media, natural resources and our atmosphere, making the whole world our wider community. The reality of the connectedness (ecology) of our planet means that through our everyday actions we become complicit in exploiting our poorest who, unlike us, are acutely aware of our utter dependance on natural resources and ecosystems. We need to realise our interdependence with our global neighbours. We can no longer believe ourselves to be individuals apart from our global ecology. We need to act quickly.

'Our destruction of nature is not just bad stewardship, or stupid economics, or a betrayal of family responsibility; it is the most horrid blasphemy. It is flinging God's gifts into His face, as if they were of no worth beyond that assigned to them by our destruction of them. .. it is not a crisis of our environs or surroundings; it is a crisis of our lives as individuals, as family members, as community members, and as citizens. We have an 'environmental crisis' because we have consented to an economy in which by eating, drinking, working, resting, travelling, and enjoying ourselves we are destroying the natural, god-given world' (Wendell Berry).

St Pope John Paul II suggests that this should be remedied by the 'ecological conversion', whereby the effects of our

encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in our actions with the world around us. By being aware of the connections we can begin this journey towards ecological conversion, we can use these existing links through our integral ecology to serve rather than exploit our neighbours. This is how we can all make a huge difference, personally, as a community and as a global church.

THE GOOD NEWS

The good news is there is lots going on in the diocese to tackle our crisis. The Bishop has just signed the diocese up to the **Journey to 2030**, a campaign run by the ECG.

In a nutshell, the Journey is a simple website providing a calendar of events and opportunities for the Catholic Church in England and Wales to get involved with. It will also provide practical advice on living more holy lives through being aware of our ecology as well as resources from the Bishop's conference to help implement change in the dioceses.

Journey to 2030 provides a focal point for different Catholic groups working in the field to co-promote their work, and an opportunity to keep signatories accountable to their pledges, and encouraged and supported in their ambitions.

Why 2030? We have, according to the UN, a decade to make unprecedented changes to stabilise our climate before we face triggering of tipping points from which there may be no return. The UN also hope to meet the Sustainable Devel-

opment Goals by 2030. It is a realistic target for us in the Catholic church to make a sustained and meaningful change. It is a commitment to a journey over a decade, not a quick campaign but a move to a more considered way of being, growing in relationship with God, our neighbour and the Earth itself.

We aim to launch the 'Journey to 2030' at the end of The Season of Creation on the feast of St Francis.

SEASON OF CREATION

The Season of Creation, an ecumenical initiative initiated in 1989 and endorsed by Pope Francis in 2015, happens each year between 1 September and 4 October each year, uniting Christians in prayer and action for the protection of our common home.

The Vatican has encouraged us this year to participate in this season. Four years after the publication of Laudato Si, we still face an urgent challenge, with increasingly dire warnings about the future we face without unprecedented changes.

The Season of Creation is an opportunity to focus on an ecological spirituality and work ethic in both the way we operate as a church and at the parish community level.

At a parish level, we would be pleased to see CAFOD's Creation Masses and the Bishops' Conference and Café Global Healing projects encouraged. We would encourage holding a Creation Celebration on the 1 September, with a screening of Global Healing the same day or

shortly afterwards, to engage parishes in the message of Laudato Si.

GETTING INVOLVED

The LiveSimply inspired activity poster which we produced with CAFOD is a perfect way of getting your parish involved in tackling our crisis and using everyone's skills and abilities.

Everyone should get involved bringing their own particular skills and interests in tackling our problem. We are working with CAFOD, Santa Marta group, Justice and Peace and our environment group within the diocese to work together on this problem which affects us all.


We will use everybody's skills to work together to tackle this ecological crisis and foster caring communities, rooted in the joy of the Gospel.


This whole campaign was started by a bunch of ordinary folk who felt compelled to do something with their education and creativity. We hope the campaign will provide a platform for you to use yours.

Saint of the Month - Venerable Matt Talbot

HEROIC IN VIRTUE as opposed to a saint, this month's focus is on the Venerable Matt Talbot who can be considered the patron of men and women struggling with alcoholism.

He was born in 1856 in Dublin, before the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). His father worked on the docks and had a difficult time supporting his family. Many of Matt's family members

were alcoholics, including his father and some of his brothers.

After a few years of schooling, Matt obtained work as a messenger for some wine merchants; there he began to drink excessively from about the age of 12. For over 15 years Matt was an active alcoholic and considered 'hopeless'. He spent his wages on alcohol, got into fights, swore, and on more than one occasion he sold possessions, including his boots - or would stealso that he could buy more drink.

One day, broke and rejected by his drinking buddies, and after a discussion with his mother he decided to take 'the pledge' for three months, make a general confession and begin to attend daily Mass. His mother encouraged Matt in the pledge 'Go, in God's name but don't take it unless you are going to keep it'.

This he did but it was very difficult for him, especially in the early years of abstinence. Avoiding his former drinking places was hard. He began to pray as intensely as he used to drink. He also tried to pay back people from whom he had borrowed or stolen money while he was drinking.

Most of his life Matt worked as a

builder's labourer, and he continued after taking the pledge until ill health stopped him in 1923. He joined the Secular Franciscan Order and began a life of strict penance and fasting; he abstained from meat nine months a year. Matt learned how to read and write and spent hours every night avidly reading Scripture and the lives of the saints. He particularly liked St Teresa of Avila, St

Teresa of Lisieux and St Catherine of Sienna. He prayed the Rosary conscientiously and made many devotions like the Stations of the Cross or novenas to the Blessed Mother. He went to Mass daily.

Though his job did not make him rich, Matt contributed generously to the missions and gave most of his money

Matt died in 1925, to all intents and purposes a pauper, on his way to church on Trinity Sunday. Fifty

years later, Pope Paul VI gave him the title Venerable.

In looking at the life of Matt Talbot, it is easy to focus on the later years when he had stopped drinking for some time and was leading a penitential life. Only alcoholic men and women who have stopped drinking can fully appreciate how difficult the earliest years of sobriety were for Matt.

He had to take one day at a time. So do the rest of us.

Process of Beatification

After a deceased Catholic has been declared a Servant of God by a bishop and proposed for beatification by the Pope, they may then be declared Venerable ('heroic in virtue'). The Congregation for the Causes of the Saints scrutinizes the evidence of the candidate's holiness, work and signs that people have been drawn to prayer through their example. To reach Beatification a miracle needs to be attributed to the prayers of the individual -this is when they are given the title 'Blessed'. Finally, with a second miracle attributed to the prayers of the candidate, the process leading to Canonization is complete.

TAXING TERMS (explained)

THE TERM **KERYGMA** comes from a Greek word that may be translated as 'proclamation' or 'preaching'. It refers to the initial and essential proclamation of the Gospel message in the New Testament, the very heart or essence of the Gospel. The word is used nine times in the New Testament, including six times in the letters of St Paul.

Pope St John Paul II put it like this: Kerygma is 'The initial, ardent proclamation, by which a person is one day overwhelmed and brought to the decision to entrust himself to Jesus Christ by faith.' (Apostolic Exhortation Catechesi Tradendae, On Catechesis in Our Time, by Pope John Paul II).

It can be distinguished from didache (another Greek work meaning teaching, instruction or doctrine), nowadays called catechesis, the fuller and more extensive doctrinal and moral teaching and Instruction in the faith that follows once an enquirer has accepted the Kerygma and been baptised.

Ideally, every Christian should be able to tell the saving story of Jesus' life in a simple and logical manner.

There are a number of summaries of the Kerygma - here is one that reflects the four stages:

- 1. God has a plan for your life.
- 2. Sin interrupts that plan and separates you from God.
- 3. Jesus Christ died and rose so that you could be forgiven of these sins and be united to God in heaven.
- 4. Through faith and his Church, you can be united to God forever. (https://media.ascensionpress.com/p odcast/kerygma/)













































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Ray Mooney's Camino Challenge



ANCER IS TRAUMATIC in anyone's life and often a time of forced reflection on what we have achieved and what we have still to do. How will loved ones cope if all goes wrong?

This was the case with Ray Mooney, recently Coordinator of the A&B Lourdes Pilgrimage Redshirts. He was diagnosed with prostate cancer in May 2018. This was not the first time he had encountered a major illness - back in 1989 his wife went to the Lord, something which left an indelible mark on him and his family.

Reasons for Walking the Camino

'Thank the Lord, my surgery was successful and having recovered I felt I wanted to make a difference; to give thanks for life and to give something back to life. I wanted to support those affected by prostate cancer and to support the Lourdes Pilgrimage' Ray reflected.

'It was important to me that, whatever I decided to do, it had to have a spiritual content. I met up with a friend who had walked the Camino Frances and this got me thinking. I decided that was what I wanted to do.

Starting the Walk

Rolling the clock forward to the end of April this year, Ray had travelled to the start of the challenging Camino, The

Way of St James. While there are a number of starting points for the pilgrimage, he decided to begin at St Jean de Port in France and to walk 500 miles to Santiago de Compostela in Spain. Thirty-five days and a million steps!

Ray continued 'I was on my own and had no real idea of what to expect. I was truly in the Lord's hands. Rucksacks were in place and here we go! However, the morning of Day One nearly finished me off! The terrain was, by far, the steepest of any other part of the Camino. Had I bitten off more than I could chew? Still, I was determined not to give up on the first day.

Surprisingly, by the time Day 8 arrived I was feeling remarkably fit and quite happy to carry on, spurred on by messages from home. I had photos hanging from my front rucksack of family and friends, some of these had passed



away. They were rotated each day as a symbolic journeying together.

There were days I would walk for hours on my own, giving me space and time for personal reflection.

One great aspect of walking the Camino is meeting people from many parts of the world. Ray's experience was no different - he walked with, shared food or accommodation with over 200 people from 37 nations. Stories were shared so quickly with complete strangers, reflecting very personal events in their lives.

These stories could easily fill a complete edition of the A&B News but, to give an example, Ray describes one particular experience.

Other Pilgrims' Stories

'I remember I had got to a resting place and met with 75 year-old Gerado and his 27 year-old daughter, Yohana. He had walked the Camino 15 times and his daughter, five times.

While talking about our Camino experiences and reasons for being here, both father and daughter suddenly burst into tears. We had only been talking for twenty minutes. They had just received a phone call saying that Yohana, only married for five years with a four yearold daughter, had to quickly return to her home in Spain and undergo an operation to remove a life-threatening tumour. Gerado had agreed with his daughter to continue his prayerful pilgrimage, as it was his way of helping in this dire situation.

I was at a loss in dealing with this unexpected news; after all, they were strangers. In my embarrassment I fumbled in my pocket and took out a finger rosary I had been given in Lourdes last year by a friend, just before my operation. I gave it to Yohana and said to keep it with her until such a time she could pass it on to another friend in need.

Returning home, with much relief I found out that the operation had been a complete success. God is good!'



When asked, would he do this again, his unhesitating response was 'Yes, it was one of the best decisions I have ever made.



Catenians' Memorial Walk for Pat Hall



MANY CATENIANS from Epsom and South West London stepped out in style on the May Bank Holiday Monday to celebrate the life of their dear friend, Pat Hall, for the first Memorial Walk in his name.

The Walk

The 12-mile walk from Hampton Court to Roehampton Gate in Richmond Park matched the average mileage that Pat, at the age of 84, walked each day on the 100-miles Camino to Santiago de Compostela in 2014.

Shorter walks suited all abilities, starting at Roehampton Gate, Pembroke Lodge and Pen Ponds car park and all ending at Roehampton Gate.

The 66 walkers included grandsons on bikes and a granddaughter in arms, who took to the tow path from Hampton Court to Kingston or from Pembroke Lodge to Roehampton Gate.

Organising Refreshements

Organiser John Flood of Epsom Circle said: 'Approaching the terrace of Richmond Hill there were steps and I suggested we each choose a number for the steps leading up to the terrace - and that the person closest to the correct answer should pay for the drinks'.

I chose 32 and the right answer was 33, so I ended up buying the round!

The last group arriving at the Roebuck Inn were soon joined on the terrace, with its spectacular view over the Thames, by those arriving from Roehampton Gate.

Walkers used the opportunity to view Henry's

Mount, created by Henry VIII, from which there is a protected view of St Paul's Cathedral.

Participants

Participants ranged from those in their 80s to one who was just five months old. Their achievement, coupled with that of the 24 cyclists on the 600 mile ride from Versailles to Lourdes in Holy Week, has secured sponsorship.

'With Gift Aid added, and sponsorship from Pat's colleagues in the London South West Catenian Circle, we could soon exceed the target of £2,500' said John shortly after the walk.

The participants included members

of the Hall family and others including Teddy Totman, also a member of Epsom Circle. Teddy walked with Pat on his first major walk, the Wainwright Coast to Coast 15 day walk. Remarkably, this was in Pat's 80th year.

As well as John, joining the memorial walk was one

other who came from Indianapolis who had walked his last major walk with him, the Camino.

There were colleagues from HCPT, Catenian brothers from both Pat's Circles, London South West & Epsom, plus brothers from Sutton, Mid-Surrey Circle and former Grand President Peter Woodford from Reigate Circle.

Concluding Mass (and pub buffet)

The walk was followed by a Mass celebrated by Pat's son, Fr Simon, and schoolboy friend, Fr Jean-Patrice Coulon MSFS, at the Kairos Centre in Roehampton. Appropriately, this was the meeting place for Pat's primary Catenian Circle.

Weary walkers ended the day with a buffet at the King's Head pub nearby, where anecdotes relating to Pat were shared and his life richly celebrated.

John added: 'Please follow Pat's lead by giving generously for the benefit of the children HCPT take to Lourdes. Anything raised in excess of £2,000 will benefit the children in Epsom - based HCPT Group 24, which made its 55th consecutive annual pilgrimage in 2019.'


EAST PRESTON WITH ANGMER-ING


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Celebrating our Schools

The Mother of God does not make appointments with visionaries.

This objection assumes a great deal of knowledge on how Our Lady operates. It is probably occasioned by Our Lady's appearances in Medjugorje at various times, told in advance to the visionaries. Most often, Our Lady appears at 17:40 every evening. Look at the facts:

• At **Guadalupe**, on the third day of the apparitions (11 December 1531), Our Lady said to Juan Diego, 'You will return here tomorrow, so you may take to the bishop the sign he has requested. (..I will await you here tomorrow).'

• At Lourdes, at the third apparition (18 February 1858), Our Lady asked Bernadette, 'Would you do me the great favour of coming here for fifteen days?'

• At **Fátima**, at the first apparition of Our Lady (13 May 1917), Our Lady told Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco, 'I came to ask you to come here on the thirteenth day for six months at this same time.'

These few examples show that Our Lady is perfectly capable of making 'appointments' with visionaries.

THE MONASTERY CHURCH, Queen of Carmel is a church built in the 21st Century for the Discalced Carmelite Fathers in Snagov, outside Bucherest, Romania. Using natural materials of warm brown timbers and marble floors that gleam whiter as they approach the altar provides an apt setting for the mosaics of Father Marko Rupnik sj.

I have loved his work ever since seeing his icon for the Year of Mercy. As you enter the church, your focus is drawn to the sanctuary in the distance where Christ sits as Judge and King.

In this large mosaic overlooking the altar we see Our Lady and John the Baptist point to Christ to acknowledge him as King and to confirm to us that He is the one. With his right hand Christ is ready to crown Our Lady. She holds in her right hand, close to her womb, two balls of knitting wool. This signifies the





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
